PAWS NY PROGRAM UPDATES

Over the course of the fiscal year, **PAWS**NY volunteers made a total of 16,200

visits to help New Yorkers and their petsand the impact has been phenomenal.

The PAWS NY Housecall Program, which is the core offering of the organization, helped 99 people and 128 pets with dog walking, litterbox maintenance, and other pet care needs in Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens, and the Bronx. After several years of virtual activities, PAWS NY focused on improving volunteer engagement, hosting a **Trivia Night at Boris & Horton** in September and its first in-person **Volunteer Holiday Party** since 2019. Held in a donated space at the Etsy headquarters in Dumbo, Brooklyn, the event brought together volunteers who made gift bags for clients, which they then delivered in person to spread holiday cheer.



"PAWS NY has made such a difference in my life," said PAWS NY client Teresa.

"My beloved cats, Lola and Gomez, are still part of their family with me, and I have a wonderful volunteer, Mia, who comes in to bring cheer to us all. It has been lifealtering for us. Every day is literally lighter and I am not alone."





ONGOING EXPANSION

PAWS NY continues to expand its reach within the outer boroughs, and in April 2023, hired Elia Rangel as our new part-time Intake Coordinator. Not only does Elia conduct client intakes and onboard new clients and pets, but she is also working on partner cultivation and creative ways to expand PAWS NY's reach, including connecting with community groups and organizations already working in these areas. Overall in fiscal year 2023, PAWS NY hosted 19 partner meetings and continued with phone and home intakes with clients throughout the year-and we expect those numbers to keep growing during the next fiscal year.

PAWS NY also expanded its connection with the **Spanish-speaking community** in New York City in several ways, including debuting a Spanish-language info page on the website, producing Spanish postcards with information about our programs and services, and creating a video in Spanish. With the leadership of **Bilingual Program Manager Victoria Leon**, PAWS NY has been able to support Spanish speakers who need our services through all aspects of the informational and onboarding process, eventually connecting them with volunteers to provide the support they need.









FOSTER & EMERGENCY CARE PROGRAM

The PAWS NY Foster and Emergency Care Program grew by leaps and bounds during the past fiscal year, with PAWS NY coordinating 2,524 days of Foster Care overall for 53 pets. As part of this work, the Preserving Families in Times of Crisis Program, funded by PetSmart Charities, continued to thrive. PAWS NY collaborates with local NYC organizations Search and Care and Animal Haven to not only provide foster and emergency care, but also help older adults plan for emergencies and determine a plan for their pets. Since the launch of the collaboration in August 2021, more than 5,000 days of foster care have been provided, more than 50 pet planning presentations have been made to organizations throughout the community, and more than 2,000 wallet cards that document a pet guardian's emergency contact information have been distributed. We are thrilled to see the impact this collaboration will have in the remaining year of this three-year grant.

As a natural extension of this program, PAWS NY is pleased to share that it is now providing foster and emergency care for pets whose guardians are seeking inpatient substance use treatment. The new Substance Use Recovery Program was developed and soft launched during the fiscal year, including the hiring of **Adrianna Ruiz as the part-time Foster Administrator** to manage the program. Adrianna has already started outreach to treatment facilities for client sourcing, updated intake forms and other documentation, and developed printed collateral pieces with more information. PAWS NY is excited to see how this program will grow and evolve, allowing us to help keep even more New Yorkers with their pets through thick and thin.

OTHER PROGRAMS

PAWS NY continues to provide pet food and supplies to our clients through our Pet Pantry. Overall, PAWS NY donated 7,061 pounds of pet food and supplies to clients this year, a retail value of \$22,000. Plus, we were thrilled to start accepting pet food donations again, after a few years off. For example, our friends at Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton & Garrison LLP hosted a pet food drive in December, collecting around 150 pounds of food and supplies to be added to the Pet Pantry.

Additionally, PAWS NY provides **veterinary care and grooming services** to clients, partnering with veterinary offices and groomers across NYC who offer discounted services to our clients. Throughout the fiscal year, PAWS NY coordinated **96 vet**



visits at a cost of \$37,096 (retail value of \$43,076), 26 grooming appointments at a cost of \$2,533 (retail value of \$3,598), and gained eight new pet care partners, including Paws at Peace and URvet Care, among others. We also hosted Instagram Live conversations with two of our partners during the year: Brooklyn's Animal Loving Care, to discuss pet grooming and wellness, and West Village Vets, who shared advice for Cat Health Month.

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT: KHADEJA

In many ways, **Khadeja** (she/her) is your typical college student. A junior at John Jay College of Criminal Justice CUNY, she can often be found in class, studying for the LSAT, or watching her favorite shows: *The Office* or *Gilmore Girls*. Plus, she really loves pizza! But Khadeja also spends time each week volunteering for PAWS NY, where she helps care for several pets in Manhattan.

Khadeja signed up to become a PAWS NY volunteer in May 2022, after reading about PAWS NY in an article about loneliness during the pandemic. She loves animals, but can't have any in her apartment, and she has been volunteering with the organization since that time.



"I've always loved caring for animals, and I knew PAWS NY would be a great place to volunteer, where I could contribute to the community and their furry friends," Khadeja said. "There are many resources to assist the elderly, but there aren't many that will tend to their pets. Pets are great companions, and it is important that they are cared for just the same."

As a volunteer, Khadeja helps care for two **cats named Barnum and Bailey**, as well as a **Rat Terrier named Bruno** (pictured with Khadeja above). She'll take Bruno out for walks along the Hudson River and help clean and refill the litterbox for the two cats.

"I remember my first day volunteering with PAWS; I was both excited and nervous," Khadeja said. "I remember vividly how excited Bruno was on our first day meeting each other: his tail was wagging, and he jumped up to meet me. Immediately all my nerves went away, and I knew it was a great match!"

Plus, she added, it's been a great experience to get to know the human clients as well. Bruno and his guardian John are always so welcoming when she picks up Bruno for his walks. And after cleaning the litterbox for Barnum and Bailey, "I have fun chats with Carol while we watch the kitties chase each other."

Khadeja has enjoyed seeing PAWS NY continue to grow and change as we emerged from the pandemic and one of her favorite memories was the Volunteer Holiday Party in December 2022—the first time PAWS NY hosted the Holiday Party in person since 2019.

"All the volunteers got together and made gift baggies for our clients and their pets. It was an amazing night filled with fun and laughter," she said. "What was also special about that night was the commitment we had to curating the perfect gifts to bring some joy to our clients."

Thanks to Khadeja for her commitment as a PAWS NY volunteer and for bringing joy to Bruno and John, and Barnum, Bailey, and Carol each week!

COMMUNICATIONS AND OUTREACH

PAWS NY ramped up its in-person outreach efforts during the year, participating in 16 events in Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens, and the Bronx. PAWS NY was at the Petzey Wellness Fair at the South Street Seaport, a Dog Costume Contest in the Bronx, a Pride event in Long Island City, and several Volunteer Service Fairs at local colleges, among other events.



When it comes to digital outreach, PAWS NY continues to connect with supporters via social media and online channels. We hosted several **Instagram Live conversations** this year, with partners including online accessibility company accessibe, programmatic partners Search and Care and West Village Vets, and several of our dedicated volunteers.

We also produced several exciting video projects this year, most notably *The Bridge*, an animated short created by



Klick Health that highlights the power of the human-animal bond. Released in January 2023, the film was featured in numerous media outlets, including Animation Magazine, PRWeek, Animation World Network, Adweek, Shots, and Fox News, and it also won numerous industry awards, including Silver and Bronze at the Cannes Lions International Festival of Creativity, a Webby Award for General Video / Health & Wellness, and a Grand Clio Health Award, among others.

Beyond the press coverage that PAWS NY received related to *The Bridge*, the organization had several one-of-a-kind features, including an **interview with PAWS NY client Dawn and her volunteer Grace on PIX11 News**; a piece about the Preserving Families in Times of Crisis Program on All for Animals TV / 1010WINS; an interview about pets and health for *Bottom Line Health* newsletter; a segment all about the organization airing on Fuji TV in Japan and online; and several podcast conversations, such as **VolunteerMatch's Time + Talent Podcast** and **Dog Save the People**.



Overall, PAWS NY loves connecting with animal lovers all across the city to find new volunteers and ensure that anyone who needs our services knows about the organization.

FUNDRAISING AND EVENTS

In-person events continued to thrive during this past year, with the **PAWS NY Barks & Blooms Benefit** once again taking place at the Monarch Rooftop in Midtown Manhattan. More than 133 people came together on Tuesday, April 25, 2023, to celebrate and raise funds and awareness for people and pets in need, while enjoying an open bar, hors d'oeuvres, and the beautiful city skyline.

The 2023 Barks & Blooms Benefit was sponsored by PetPlate and hosted by Lucas Hunt of Hunt Auctioneers, and the event recognized two incredible honorees: longtime partner the **American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) and volunteer Cammy Hickman**. PAWS NY also shared a video featuring client Ruth, who turned 102 a month before the event, and her volunteer Alix Sobler, which was filmed by Levi Barrie and edited by Blonde & Co.

Overall, PAWS NY raised more than \$168,000 throughout the evening!











In addition to the Benefit, PAWS NY coordinated several smaller fundraisers during the year, including a **Trivia Night at dog-friendly cafe Boris & Horton**, hosted by Puppy Bowl Referee Dan Schachner, and selling tickets to a **New York Mets game**!

Once again, PAWS NY was an Official Charity Partner for both the **TCS New York City Marathon and the United Airlines NYC Half**, coordinating two teams that raised a total of \$98,338 for PAWS NY. We look forward to growing our participation in these iconic New York City events and raising even more money through Barks & Blooms and all our fundraisers in the future!

FUNDER SPOTLIGHT: ASPCA

The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA®) has been a long-time partner of PAWS NY, providing both programmatic support and funding for more than a decade. Throughout our partnership, we collaboratively work with their Community Engagement team, and we refer clients to each other. Additionally, the ASPCA has **donated nearly \$350,000 to PAWS NY** over the years.

While being recognized as an honoree at the 2023 Barks & Blooms Benefit this past April, the ASPCA **presented PAWS NY with an unrestricted \$100,000 grant**. These funds will be used to provide critical services to people and pets in need across New York City.






